


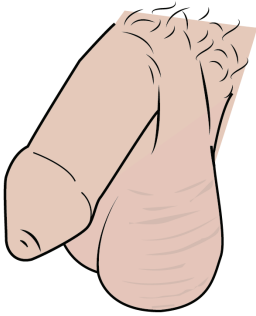


## Chlamydia information for men and women

|    | <p>Chlamydia is the most common sexually transmitted infection (STI)</p>  |
|    | <p>If you have unprotected sex (have sex and don't use a condom) you may get chlamydia</p>  |
|  | <p>Men/boys and women/girls can get chlamydia</p> <p>Women/girls with chlamydia may have;</p> <p>Pain in their tummy, below the belly button</p> <p>OR</p> <p>Pain when peeing or having sex</p> <p>OR</p> <p>Bleeding after sex or in between your periods</p> |



Men/boys with chlamydia may have;

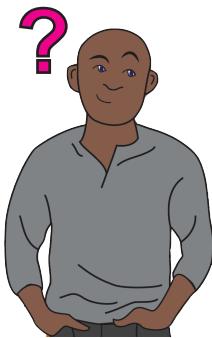
Pain when peeing

OR

Discharge (which is a liquid) coming from the end of your penis

OR

Pain in your balls



Most people do not show any symptoms, so will not know if they have it.

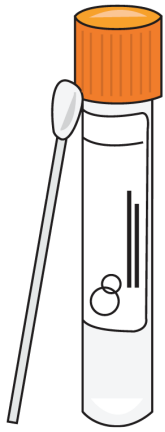
To find out if you have chlamydia, you need to get tested.

To get a test, you can ring 01522 308800 to find your nearest clinic.

If you are at school, you can ask your school nurse.

Men/boys pee in a pot and women/girls can either pee in a pot or swab just inside the vagina. You do this yourself.

The person who gives you the test will explain what to do and how you will get your results.



If you have got chlamydia don't worry, it can be treated with tablets. A nurse will contact you to let you know where to go to get your treatment.



Using condoms every time you have sex can help to stop you catching chlamydia and other sexually transmitted infections and prevent women from getting pregnant.
